COUNCIL BRIEFS

The Council meeting was held on Tuesday 16 March 2021 and some of the outcomes from the meeting include:

Item 10.1 Rose Maze Report

At the request of the Shire, Colin Barlow, Director of Gardens from Eden, investigated why some of the roses within the Rose Maze were dying, or suffering defoliation. The final detailed report was presented to Council and adopted.

Item 11.3 Local Government Child Safety Officers and Proposed Reportable Conduct Scheme

The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) on behalf of the Western Australian Government (State Government) is implementing proposed reforms arising from the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, including:

- Developing a system of independent oversight to improve child safety in organisations; and
- Developing a State policy position on the Royal Commission's recommendation 6.12 specifying that local governments should designate child safety officers from within existing staff profiles.

The Royal Commission highlighted the important roles local governments play in communities that impact on the safety of children including:

- providing services to children, for example libraries, swimming pools and childcare;
- providing spaces for community activities, for example halls, theatres and sports grounds;
- funding or contracting services;
- facilitating community education or outreach programs;
- regulating planning and development approvals, infrastructure and property services; and
- water and food inspection.

The active role local governments take in community development and community safety, particularly roles that impact on child safety, was recognised as an opportunity to integrate their direct responsibilities to children with their wider role within the community, however there is a great deal to be considered before implementing such reforms.

Councils decision was as follows:

That with respect to Local Government Child Safety Officers and the proposed Reportable Conduct Scheme, Council:

- 1. Respond to the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries' Discussion Paper, in accordance with the comments contained within the Officers' Report advising that Council have concerns regarding the functions specified in Recommendation 6.12, specifically the training of staff for this role and funding the increased position requirements;
- 2. Endorse the principles outlined in the National Principles for Child Safe Organisations;
- 3. Endorse the principles of local governments being able to support and promote messages about child safety in its venues, facilities and services it provides to children; and

4. Endorse the principles of the draft bill and request the Chief Executive Officer to ensure that the Shire and its employees comply with any requirements of the Shire, or its employees, in implementing any Child Safety Reportable Conduct Scheme, should such laws be enacted.




Do you know the story that is:

THE KODJA PLACE

A fascinating window through which to view the many paths that have led to the vigorous and vital district of Kojonup.

Commencing with the Noongar Seasons, a mural Painted by Craig McVee, the story is about the Mardjit (snake) who created the water holes, streams and creek beds.



The mural highlights the six seasons of indigenous culture which are as follows:

Birak	Summer	Mid December to mid February
Bunura	Autumn	Mid February to mid April
Djeran	Windy	Mid April to mid June
Makuru	Winter	Mid June to mid August
Djilba	Windy	Mid August to mid October
Kambarang	Spring	Mid October to mid December

The water holes show the changes during the different seasons. On the outer edge of the mural, the colours are of the skies and the inner sections are of changes in the land. For example, the bottom water hole represents a dry river crossing after the summer dry.

The eggs of the mardjit represent new life. The small dots represent the White man (Wadjelas) exploring new and unfamiliar countryside. They extend beyond the mural, becoming larger as the Wadjelas began to make an impact on the land.



How It Works





THE VALLEY OF LOST STORIES – VANESSA MCCAUSLAND: Beautiful, beguiling and treacherous ... Big Little Lies meets Picnic at Hanging Rock in a secluded valley over the Blue Mountains. Four women and their children are invited to the beautiful but remote Capertee Valley, west of the Blue Mountains. Once home to a burgeoning mining industry, now all that remains are ruins slowly being swallowed by the bush and the jewel of the valley, a stunning, renovated Art Deco hotel.

This is a place haunted by secrets. In 1948 Clara Black walked into the night, never to be seen again. As the valley beguiles these four friends, and haunts them in equal measure, each has to confront secrets of her own: Nathalie, with a damaged marriage; Emmie, yearning for another child; Pen, struggling as a single parent; and Alexandra,

hiding in the shadow of her famous husband. But as the mystery of what happened seventy years earlier unravels, one of the women also vanishes into this bewitching but wild place, forcing devastating truths to the surface.



THE BODY IN THE WAKE – KATHERINE PAIGE: Amateur detective and caterer Faith Fairchild is at her Penobscot Bay, Maine cottage preparing for a summer wedding, when she stumbles across another body in this 25th entry in the beloved mystery series. For the first time in years, Faith Fairchild has time for herself. Her husband Tom is spending days on the other side of the island using a friend's enhanced WiFi for a project; their son, Ben, after his first year in college, is studying abroad for the summer; and their daughter Amy is working at the old Laughing Gulls Lodge, now a revamped conference center.

Faith is looking forward to some projects of her own. Her friend Sophie Maxwell is also spending the summer on Sanpere Island, hoping for distractions from her worries that

she isn't yet pregnant. And the daughter of Faith's good friend Pix Miller is getting married to a wonderful guy, with a less-than-wonderful mother.

Between keeping Sophie's spirits up and Pix's blood pressure down, Faith has her hands full and that's before a body with a mysterious tattoo and connections far away from small Sanpere Island appears in the Lily Pond. Once again, Faith will get to the bottom of this strange case—and whip up a delicious blueberry buckle on the side.



THE ACADAMY OF MAGIC – PG – DVD: From the creator of Cars, The Academy of Magic is a spellbinding adventure that fans of Harry Potter will love! Aura is no ordinary young girl --she is gifted with magical powers. When a mysterious creature leads her to Montrose, a magic academy for children with extraordinary powers, Aura and her friends soon learn that the school has a secret that Aura must uncover to protect herself and her friends.





THE GIRL ON THE BRIDGE – M - DVD. The Girl On The Bridge is a feature documentary directed by award winning New Zealand filmmaker Leanne Pooley. It is a glimpse into a world few of us

comprehend and a response to our collective anguish about the suicide crisis in our communities and our desire to "do something".

Twenty-two year old Jazz Thornton survived multiple suicide attempts and is now taking on a system she believes is failing her generation. After founding her own charity to support young people struggling as she once did, she's put herself through film school to learn the skills she needs to communicate. She tells stories about survivors

who have been through hell and made it back. But not everyone makes it and although Jazz has survived she's lost a lot of friends, including sixteen-year-old Jess. Jess's death was painful and potentially catastrophic for Jazz and in The Girl On The Bridge she navigates the same feelings of guilt and grief that anyone touched by suicide endures. Jazz promised Jess she would tell her story and The Girl On The Bridge follows her as she fulfils that promise and creates a documentary series about losing Jess, called Jessica's Tree.

Filmed over a two year period, The Girl On The Bridge follows Jazz as she deals with her own internal battles as she creates Jessica's Tree and as she increasingly finds herself the face of the suicide epidemic unfolding around her. Young people and their families turn to her in desperation asking her to "save" them. She juggles the pressure of their expectations while doing all she can to change the societal prejudices that helped create the problem in the first place.

The Girl On The Bridge is the story of a young woman with the weight of a generation on her shoulders. Having survived her own struggles and dealing with the loss of her friend Jazz has irrefutable insight into a subject society has only begun to grapple with. This is a film about hope. It's a film about redemption.

The Girl On The Bridge is a challenge to all of us to try to understand.

Grants for Women Studying Agribusiness

Curtin's Associate Degree in Agribusiness has been offered 10 places in the Australian Government's Women in STEM program in 2021.
