Council Meeting Outcomes – 10 December 2019

Outcomes from Council Meeting - 10 December 2019

NRM Advisory Committee

"That Council:

- 1. Receive the Natural Resource Management Committee unconfirmed minutes for the meeting held 14 November 2019.
- 2. That Council accepts Phil Worts as a Community Representative of the Natural Resource Management Advisory Committee.
- 3. Endorse the Natural Resource Management Advisory Committee decision 12/19 that 1 Ha along the northern side of the Old Rubbish Tip road be revegetated with native species in 2020/2021 with a Budget provision of \$3,930.
- 4. Endorse the Natural Resource Management Advisory Committee decision 13/19 to make provision of \$10,000 within the 2020/2021 budget to progress the removal of Kojonup Town Site weeds."



Kojonup Pastoral and Agricultural Society Inc.

"That Council:

- 1. Provides in-principle support to the Kojonup Pastoral and Agricultural Society Incorporated (P & A Society) lodging applications seeking Commonwealth funding under the Regional Agricultural Show Development Grants Program conditional upon any structures erected using grant funds being capable of being relocated (if required) in the future; and
- 2. Requests the CEO to explore options 2, 3 & 4 as listed in the Officer Report with the P & A Society."

The Kodja Place – Operating Hours

"That Council authorise the Chief Executive Officer to implement the new Kodja Place and Visitor Centre operating hours of 9.00am to 4.00pm effective from 1 February 2020."

Development Approval For The George Church Community Medical Centre On Lots 2 & 3 (No's 30 & 32) Spring Street, Kojonup

- Council grant development approval for the medical centre use/development on Lots 2 & 3 (No's 30 & 32) Spring Street, Kojonup subject to the following conditions/advice:
 - a) The development to be fully implemented consistent with the attached stamped approved plans and where marked in red, unless a variation has been approved in writing by the Chief Executive Officer.
 - b) The lots to be amalgamated to the satisfaction of the Chief Executive Officer (confirmation of the Landgate dealing number or similar) prior to the building permit being issued.
 - c) The external building walls to be finished and/or painted in a colour/tone to the satisfaction of the Shire of Kojonup.
 - d) The roof to be clad in metal sheeting in a colour/tone to the satisfaction of the Shire of Kojonup.
 - e) Enter into a Deed of Agreement as prepared by M Rogers and tabled at the 19 November 2019 Council meeting regarding the car park on Lot 2 Spring Street being available for use as a Public Car Park as well as serving the Medical Centre.
 - f) The on-site car parking areas shown in the approved plans to the set-out, sealed, drained and linemarked to the satisfaction of the Shire of Kojonup.
 - g) The new access/egress crossover points onto Spring Street and Barracks Place to be sited, designed and constructed to the satisfaction of the Shire of Kojonup. The proponent is responsible to meet all costs of connecting to the Shire's road networks including repairs to existing footpaths, kerbs, drainage pipes etc.
 - h) The new access paths to be matched to the existing paths along Spring Street and Barracks Place to the satisfaction of the Shire of Kojonup.
 - i) The building to be connected to the Water Corporation deep sewer and water supply networks.
 - j) All stormwater to be retained and/or disposed of or reused on-site unless discharge off-site to the Shire's drainage system has been approved. The proponent is responsible to meet all costs of connecting to the Shire's drainage system.
 - k) The proponent is to be responsible for all landscaping.
 - I) The bin storage area to include screen fencing, concrete floor, floor waste and water supply tap.
 - m) The building to comply with the WA Planning Commission's State Planning Policy 3.7 'Planning in Bushfire Prone Areas' and AS3959 'Construction of buildings in bushfire prone areas'.
 - n) The proponent is to submit a separate application to Council for signage approval.
 - o) Payment of the development application fee of \$3,627.50 as set out in the adopted List of Fees and Charges is waived.

Advice Notes:



- *i)* The construction of the medical centre requires a separate Building Permit to be obtained prior to any works commencing.
- *ii)* The provision of a rubbish service for the proposal will need to be negotiated through the Shire.
- 2) Council in accordance with the Planning and Development Act 2005 and Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015, initiate Town Planning Scheme No. 3 Amendment No. 14 to remove Lot 2 Spring Street from the Recreation local authority scheme reserve and include it in the Public Purposes local authority scheme reserve to match Lot 3 under the new amalgamated lot. The amendment is considered a standard amendment on the basis that it is:
 - (a) an amendment relating to a zone or reserve that is consistent with the objectives identified in the scheme for that zone or reserve;
 - (e) an amendment that would have minimal impact on land in the scheme area that is not subject of the amendment;
 - (f) an amendment that does not result in any significant environmental, social, economic or governance impacts on land in the scheme area; and
 - (g) an amendment that is not a complex or basic amendment.

Workforce Plan 2019-2023

That Council adopt the reviewed Workforce Plan 2019 - 2023

- 1. Call for public tender the lease of the land at 162 Blackwood Road, with the following conditions applying:

 - d) The Shire will not be liable for any issues arising from fencing and/or containment of stock;

 - f) Any stocking rates will be agreed by both parties on an 'as needs' basis to respond to any animal welfare, fire hazard reduction, and land quality preservation issues that may arise.



Noongar Bush Tucker: Bush Food Plants and Fungi of the South-West of Western Australia – By Vivienne Hansen and John Horsfall

Before the colonisation of Australia, Aboriginal Australians lived on a wonderful larder of fresh fruit, vegetables and lean meat, in a land largely free from disease, with more exercise, less stress and supportive communities.



Today, in Aboriginal communities all over Australia, there are higher instances of heart disease, type 2 diabetes, renal disease, some types of cancer and lung diseases than in the general population.

This book is an attempt to preserve bush tucker knowledge for future generations of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people to ensure the information is not lost with the passing of Elders.

The authors describe over 260 species of the edible plants and fungi that were regularly gathered by the Noongars of the Bibbulmun Nation of the south-west of Western Australia before and after colonisation. Many of these plants and fungi are difficult to find today because of land clearing for crops and the farming of sheep and cattle.









Holiday Stargazers Information:

If Christmas preparations are a busy time for you, stargazing gives you time to take a breath and relax. So, head outside on Christmas night to do a bit of star watching.

Looking at the night sky is awe-inspiring and yet peaceful and calming at the same time. It's bound to refresh your spirits, relax your mind and get you ready for the next day ahead.

There are two beautiful bright objects to be seen. One is a star and the other is a planet!

When to look: 8.15pm, 24th December 2019 Which direction to look: West and east

In the west, the brightest star-like object to be seen low on the horizon is not a star at all. It's Venus! After sunset, it will dazzle you with its brightness!

On the eastern horizon, the brightest star you can see is actually the brightest star we see in the night sky. Sirius is part of the constellation of Canis Major (the Greater Dog). It's not as bright as Venus but can easily be identified.

Something Interesting

Do you wonder if there is an astronomical explanation for the Star of Bethlehem? There are a few theories – perhaps it was a comet, a supernova or perhaps a planetary conjunction (or close grouping of planets). <u>Read more with the Lowell Observatory</u>. The Lowell Observatory is located in Flagstaff, Arizona – the World's First International Dark Sky City.

LANDCARE

Want to get rid of your Rabbit problem? Order your RHDV1-K5 calicivirus now!

The NRM/Landcare Officer has been contacted by a number of farmers with rabbit problems wanting to release the rabbit biocontrol RHDV1 K5 (Korean strain of Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus). For maximum effectiveness, a coordinated, landscape scale release of rabbit biological control viruses will maximise effectiveness and produce greater results than patchy, individual landholder releases.



RHDV1K5 is a variant of rabbit haemorrhagic disease virus (RHDV1) that causes a fatal haemorrhagic disease in the European rabbit (Oryctolagus cuniculus). It is specific to the European rabbit, and once a rabbit shows symptoms,



death is rapid. There is no treatment or cure for rabbit haemorrhagic disease (RHD); however, a vaccine for domestic and production rabbits is available.

RHDV is spread by insect vectors, such as bushflies and blowflies. Direct contact between a rabbit and a rabbit carcass with RHDV is also an avenue of spread. Animals that predate on rabbit carcasses such as foxes, dogs and cats may also excrete the virus in their faeces.

The supply and use of RHDV1 K5 in WA to authorised users was enabled under the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Regulations Amendment 2017 (Government Gazette Friday, 3 February 2017). Under the regulations, anyone who will be handling and mixing the liquid suspension virus must complete on-line training to become authorised users of RHDV. RHDV1-K5 Authorisation Training is available from DAFWA's <u>Client Online Training</u> website.

An order for the virus vials will be done through the Shire of Kojonup NRM/Landcare Officer in order to avoid the \$50 shipping fee per order. If you would like a vial, the online training must be completed, then place your order by contacting the NRM/Landcare Officer, Jane Kowald, on 0428712050 or landcare@kojonup.wa.gov.au, vials cost \$120 each and only 1 vial/1500 Ha is required.

BUSHFIRES, INCREASED VEHICLE STRIKES AND MORE...SUMMER IS A TOUGH TIME FOR OUR NATIVE ANIMALS

While most of us are enjoying end-of-year celebrations and perhaps taking the family on a holiday to one of our stunning national parks, the native animals we love are under intensified threat. More wildlife babies are born during the warmer months and it's also 'breeding season', so adults are on the move searching for a mate. Concurrently, many more of us are on the road at this time of year, so the number of animals struck by cars and other vehicles increases.



How to Assist Injured Wildlife

- If you come across an injured native animal, the best way to save its life is to first call your nearest accredited Wildlife Carer. Kojonup's nearest accredited Wildlife Carer's are:
 - <u>Roo Gully Wildlife Sanctuary, Boyup Brook</u>. Undertakes emergency rescues and cares for all species of wildlife. Phone: (08) 9765 1514 Emergency: 0429 651 510
 - <u>Great Southern Care Wildlife, Mount Barker</u> This volunteer group mainly cares for orphaned, sick and injured kangaroo joeys. Mobile: 0401 334 729

2. While waiting for a rescuer or before taking an injured animal to a vet:





- Cover the animal with a towel or blanket and remove from threats.
- Do not attempt to pick up a bat or snake wait for expert assistance.
- Keep the animal calm and safe by placing it in a ventilated cardboard box, covered cage or similar.
 Keep the animal in a warm, quiet, dark and undisturbed place.
- DO NOT offer any food or water (unless advised by a vet or wildlife carer).
- Contact a wildlife care service. If this isn't possible, take the injured animal to a nearby vet ASAP.
- If you see a dead marsupial, always check the pouch for a living joey.

3. Download and print a Wildlife Emergency Card and write the name and contact number of your nearest rescue organisation on the card.

Need a Mistletoe to kiss under this Xmas? Look no further than the largest in the world, the Aussie Christmas Tree, Nuytsia floribunda.

AUSTRALIA HAS A PARASITE believed to be the largest in the world, a tree whose greedy roots stab victims up to 110m away. The Christmas tree (*Nuytsia floribunda*) has blades for slicing into the roots of plants to steal their sap. The blades are sharp enough to draw blood on human lips. They cause power failures when the tree attacks buried cables by mistake. Telephone lines get cut as well.

The Christmas tree is indiscriminate, stealing juice from almost anything green – grasses, sedges, carrots, weeds, vines, shrubs, and eucalypts. It sometimes attacks its own roots by mistake, and fallen twigs as well. When one of its roots meet another root it forms a collar of tissue around it, like a swollen wedding ring, and a hydraulically operated blade forms inside that. Each tree attaches to hordes of victims.

The Christmas tree is an icon of the region it grows in, south-western Australia, because it blooms so dramatically in summer. The showy orange flowers have been likened to 'a bushfire without smoke'. When heathlands are destroyed to create pastures, Christmas trees are often left standing because of their beauty, and they carry on by feeding off grass.



This tree is very significant to the Noongar people. Around Perth it was considered sacred, a being in which the spirits of the newly dead resided. Elsewhere in the south-west it was valued for edible roots and for edible gum oozing from the trunk. I have sampled the cooked roots and found them pleasantly starchy.

The Christmas tree is a member of the southern mistletoe family (Loranthaceae), standing apart from most mistletoes by growing as a tree rather than a shrub attached to trees. It belongs to the oldest lineage in its family, from a time before most mistletoes had become aerial parasites.

Australia is well endowed with trees and shrubs that steal from other plants through their roots. The best known include desert quandong (Santalum acuminatum), Australian sandalwood (S. spicatum) and native cherry (Exocarpos cupressiformes). Technically speaking, these plants, along with mistletoes, are called hemiparasites, because they photosynthesise for themselves rather than stealing everything they need from their hosts.


