COUNCIL BRIEFS

The Local Government Review Panel Final Report on proposed changes to the Local Government Act 1995 is now available from https://www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au/department/publications/publication/local-government-review-panel-final-report

Summary

- In 2017 the State Government announced a review of the Local Government Act 1995.
- Given the breadth of matters covered by the Local Government Act, a staged approach to the review was adopted.
- Stage one: priority reforms
- Stage two: wide ranging reforms leading to a new Local Government Act
- The Department of Local Government carried out a consultation process in 2018/19 where over 3,000 submissions were received.
- The Minister for Local Government appointed an Independent Panel to consider submissions received by the Department of Local Government Sport and Cultural Industries on the review of the Local Government Act in November 2019.
- The Panel's report has made 65 recommendations
- The Panel's report does not represent Government policy; the Minister for Local Government has stated the report will be considered as part of the Act Review process.
- The Minister for Local Government has not considered the Panel's recommendations at this stage and has not requested a consultation process on the report. WALGA is taking the opportunity to obtain a sector opinion on the recommendations to provide to the Minister.

Shire of Kojonup delegates met with Great Southern Zone delegates in Woodanilling on 28 August 2020 to list opposition to recommendations contained within the report for the attention of the Minister for Local Government and State Parliament. For example, the Shire of Kojonup opposes: -

- a multi-tiered legislative framework.
- all local government elections being overseen by the West Australian Electoral Commission.
- Changing first past the post vote for preferential voting.
- Postal voting be required rather than casting a vote in person at a polling place.
- Introducing a caretaker policy barring elected members up for re-election from representing the council at events, handing out council grants or donations and moving substantive notices of motion in the period before the election.
- All in All out, elections
- Reducing number of elected members with populations up to 5000 to 5 councillors (including President).
- Using TendersWA as the primary tender platform.
- Breaches of the Local Government procurement rules being referred to the Office of the Independent Assessor.
- The majority of Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee members including the Chair, should be independent of the Local Government and be drawn from a suitably qualified panel.



SHIRE OF KOJONUP

- Reducing the impost on small local governments, the above committee could be established on a regional basis.
- Live streaming of Council meetings.
- Establishing a Local Government Commission and abolishing the Local Government Grants Commission and Local Government Advisory Board when terms of reference are not known.

WALGA State Council met on 2 September 2020 to finalise an industry response which will be included on the Shire's website when available.



Early Years Activities - Sensory Play Ideas for Kids....you can do at home easily!

Giving kids the freedom to be messy is not only good fun, it can help develop their hand-eye coordination and basic motor skills, too.

<u>Toddlers</u> especially take great pleasure from exploring tactile objects – anything involving bright colours, unusual textures and satisfying sounds is bound to be a hit! These projects for sensory play are all easy to prepare, budget-friendly and use everyday items that you're likely to already have at home. They're all child-safe, although adult supervision during play is always recommended.



Ice block treasure hunt

Freeze small toys inside a block of ice and older kids can excavate their very own artefacts! Put a few toys, such as dinosaurs, in the bottom of a container, then partly fill with water and freeze; repeat until full. Provide children's tools or cutlery and help them bash into the ice.

Play with slime

This simple recipe for edible slime is perfect for toddlers – it's safe enough for them to put in their mouth to explore the texture, but we'd advise against making a meal of it!.

Marshmallow Slime:

- 1 cup (50 g) mini-marshmallows
- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) vegetable or coconut oil
- 2 tablespoons (16 g) icing sugar
- 2 tablespoons (25 g) Cornflour
- 1 tablespoon (10 g) sprinkles, optional
- 4 to 5 drops of food colouring, optional

Melt the marshmallows and oil in the microwave, when cooled pour onto the icing sugar & cornflour mixture kneading until mixed, add sprinkles & colouring if desired.



What's new to our Library?


The Dickens Boy: In the late 1800s, rather than run the risk of his under-achieving sons tarnishing his



reputation at home, Charles Dickens sent two of them to Australia. The tenth child of Charles Dickens, Edward Bulwer Lytton Dickens, known as Plorn, had consistently proved unable 'to apply himself' to school or life. So aged sixteen, he is sent, as his brother Alfred was before him, to Australia. Plorn arrives in Melbourne in late 1868 carrying a terrible secret. He has never read a word of his father's work. He is sent out to a 2000-square-mile station in remotest New South Wales to learn to become a man, and a gentleman stockman, from the most diverse and toughest of companions. In the outback he becomes enmeshed with Paakantji, colonists, colonial-born, ex-convicts, exsoldiers, and very few women. This is Tom Keneally in his most familiar terrain. Taking historical figures and events and reimagining them with verve, compassion and humour.

The book of lost friends: A new novel inspired by historical events: a story of three young women on a journey in search of family amidst the destruction of the post-Civil War South, and of a modern-day teacher who rediscovers their story and its connection to her own students' lives.



After the count: the Death of Davey Browne: When Sydney boxer Davey Browne died in 2015 after being


knocked out in the final round of a title fight that he was about to win, boxing once again came under intense public scrutiny.



Word of the Day . . . "Forte"

Noun | FOR-tay

Definitions: 1 - one's strong point. 2 - the part of a sword or foil blade that is between the middle and the hilt and that is the strongest part of the blade.

Did You Know? Forte derives from the sport of fencing. When English speakers borrowed the word from French in the 17th century, it referred to the strongest part of a sword blade, between the middle and the hilt. It is therefore unsurprising that forte eventually developed an extended metaphorical sense for a person's strong point. (Incidentally, forte has its counterpoint in the word foible, meaning both the weakest part of a sword blade and a person's weak point.) There is some controversy over how to correctly pronounce forte. Common choices in American English are "FOR-tay" and "for-TAY," but many usage commentators recommend rhyming it with fort. In French, it would be written le fort and pronounced more similar to English for. You can take your choice, knowing that someone somewhere will dislike whichever variant you choose. All, however, are standard.

Bread Tag Collection Point at the Shire of Kojonup Library



Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs collects bread tags nationally in Australia. The tags are recycled locally, raising funds to buy wheelchairs for disadvantaged people in South Africa. Tags can be dropped at the Kojonup Library. Bread Tags for Wheelchairs has been running in South Africa since 2006. After Mary Honeybun, who started the organisation, retired from a long and successful nursing career she found that she could not 'retire' from her passion to help people.

During her nursing career she realised how important it is, both physically and emotionally, for a person disabled by an accident or a medical condition, to have the mobility that a wheelchair gives them. She also learnt how much the burden on the family and carers of a disabled person is eased if the disabled person has this mobility. Furthermore, she was aware that the majority of people in need of wheelchairs in South Africa were often unable to afford to buy their own. So, she decided that she would put her efforts into providing them.

And so, after many hours of research, Mary came up with the idea of recycling bread tags, which usually go into landfill, and using the funds to provide wheelchairs. The rest, as they say, is history!

In February 2019, we delivered our first batch of tags to our Australian recycler, <u>Transmutation – Reuse, Reduce, Recycle</u>, who are based in Robe in South Australia. They now take monthly consignments of tags from us, and all bread tags collected in Australia are recycled locally. The funds raised are regularly remitted to South Africa to buy wheelchairs.

South Africans who cannot afford a wheelchair can apply to the organisation and get in the queue for a basic wheelchair. There is nowhere near the level of funding for disability services in South Africa as there is in Australia, so someone who cannot afford to buy their own wheelchair may not be able to get one at all.

Thinking a fire event will never happen to you is not only complacent, but irresponsible. By at least making an effort to protect your property you will inadvertently be protecting your neighbours and the volunteer fire brigade as well. Informing your neighbour that may live outside of Kojonup of fuel load hazards will be advantageous. Repeal Local Law 2020

Purpose: to repeal outdated legislation (being the Shire of Kojonup's Fencing By-Law gazetted on 23 December 1971 and its subsequent amendments gazetted on 31 August 1990 and 20 March 1992) identified during the Shire of Kojonup's review of its local laws.

Effect: the repeal of the Shire of Kojonup's obsolete Fencing By-law gazetted on 23 December 1971 and its subsequent amendments gazetted on 31 August 1990 and 20 March 1992.


Our community programs are supported by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC).

With less than 30 days until the start of Containers for Change, WA's new container deposit scheme, the McGowan Government has today launched an online resource to guide Western Australians to their closest refund point.

From October 1, 2020, Western Australians will be able to cash in their eligible drink containers for 10 cents each at any authorised Containers for Change refund point.

With 74 operators right across the State, Western Australia will be home to the most diversely operated refund point network in Australia. At launch, 35 per cent of refund points will be operated by social enterprises and not-for-profits, 15 per cent by local governments, and the remaining 50 per cent by commercial operators, including many local small businesses.

Western Australians will be able to receive their container refunds in cash, via direct bank deposit, or to donate refunds to a community group or charity.
