COUNCIL BRIEFS

The last Council Meeting for the year was held on Tuesday 8 December with an only small number of items on the Agenda. Some of the outcomes of the meeting were:

12.3 Occupational Safety and Health Committee Terms of Reference Council received the new Terms of Reference for the Occupational Safety and Health Committee.

12.4 Reserve Account Appropriateness Review – 2020/2021

The Shire has established Reserve accounts for the purpose of providing a funding source for major projects as contained within the Community Strategic Plan and the appropriateness of these reserves is reviewed annually. This review has now occurred and has been received by Council.

15.1 Elected Member Fees & Allowances

Cr Gale put forward a Notice of Motion regarding elected member fees and allowances for considerations of Council. Upon review, Council decided that the current remuneration, being 75% of the allocated funding as determined by the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal, are adequate and do not require adjustment.

17.1 CEO Recruitment

Council have resolved to appoint Lester Blades as the independent recruitment Consultant to undertake the recruitment, selection and appointment of the next CEO.

Electric Vehicle Charging Point – Official Opening

On 27 November, with assistance from Synergy and Gemtek, the Shire officially opened the new Electric Vehicle Charging Point at The Kodja Place.

This project has been in the pipeline for nearly 12 months, and it was wonderful to hold an event to celebrate its conclusion. The unit was officially opened by Shire President John Benn, with attendance from many different electric vehicles vying to be the first to use the charger. This charging unit allows for a 45 minute charge time from empty for most vehicles, and has different plug options to suit cars currently in production. It is operated on the Chargefox billing system, and Council has opted for the unit to be free of charge until the end of June 2021 to promote use of the unit and encourage visitors to stop in Kojonup.

Synergy hosted those in attendance for a morning tea at Kodja Place, and quite a few electric vehicle owners were happy to take visitors for a test run in their cars.



CEO Rick Mitchell-Collins had these comments regarding the charging point:

"Kojonup's location on the Albany Highway is ideal for the installation of the clever energy EV Charger as motorists travelling North/South, East/West in the Great Southern Region now have certainty in supply when contemplating travelling from Perth to Albany or from the South West Region to the Great Southern hinterland. The EV Charge Point location close to The Kodja Place and Shopping Precinct allows visitors time to explore our wonderful town. The Shire of Kojonup is delighted to be associated with the 'Synergy' EV initiative and local Noongar Elder, Craig McVee's artwork (Connecting with Community) complements the six season's mural within the Kodja Place Storyplace/Gallery.

Hopefully EV charge points like Kojonup's will become the norm rather than the exception when travelling rural WA"

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School Holiday Road Safety

After a challenging and different school year, students and teachers are no-doubt looking forward to the School Holidays that will start on Friday 18 December 2020 and run through until 31 January 2021.

This means there will be more children walking, riding and scooting around local streets as well as more people travelling long distances for their holidays. The Shire of Kojonup is asking all drivers to take extra care during this period.

Drivers on local roads are encouraged to slow down especially around areas like playgrounds and skate parks where children are likely to congregate, while drivers heading off on a long trip are reminded to ensure they are well rested and take regular breaks to avoid the dangers of driving tired.

To help you be safe on the roads over the holidays drivers are also being encouraged to

- Turn off your mobile phone before driving;
- Buckle up when travelling in a vehicle;
- Adapt your speed to the weather, light, traffic and road conditions;
- Take a break, have a rest and where possible swap drivers on long trips;
- Visit one of the many operating Driver Reviver or Coffee Stops along your journey; and
- Plan ahead. If you are planning to drink, arrange a skipper, organise a taxi or stay overnight.

Black Cockatoo's why are they disappearing?

There are a number of threats facing Carnaby's Black-Cockatoo:

- Habitat fragmentation, particularly in the northern and eastern areas of the Wheatbelt. Most habitat
 suitable for breeding and feeding in the Wheatbelt has been cleared entirely or fragmented. In
 addition, clearing of heathland surrounding breeding sites has reduced the survival rate of fledglings
 by decreasing the available food sources for the young
- Removal of nest hollows for use as firewood or just to make properties look 'tidy'. Much woodland lacks hollows, and it takes over 100 years for woodland seedlings to mature and form hollows suitable for nesting
- Competition for hollows from other species
- Loss of native food sources caused by urban development on the Swan coastal plain
- Poaching: illegal poaching is still a threat trees are often cut down or the hollow severely damaged when young and eggs are taken, removing breeding sites
- Invasive species: other bird species such as the Galah and the Western Long-billed Corella are extending their range in the Wheatbelt and are competing with and excluding Carnaby's Black-Cockatoos from traditional nest hollows.

When was the last time you saw a Christmas spider in the garden?

These festive spiders are commonly found all over Australia, including Tasmania.

Christmas Spiders (Austracantha minax) are lovely little spiders that belong to the orb-weaving spider family Araneidae, and like their relative build delicate orb-webs which are rather sticky.



Their prey consists of small flying insects which they consume in their webs after wrapping them in silk and injecting them with venom.

The adult females are less than 1 cm in length, and have several pointed spines on their abdomen, with brightly coloured patches of white, orange and blue. The males are much smaller than the females, and are more uniformly coloured.

Christmas Spiders are most easily observed during spring and summer, with the adult females maturing at this time. They often congregate in large numbers, and are less common in urban settings than in past decades, probably due to insecticides and lack of suitable habitat. However, they are still common in bushland habitats.

Shire of Kojonup success for two 2020 Community Stewardship Grants Program through State Natural Resource Management program

96 community projects worth a total of \$7.5 million were announced by the State Government to protect and improve WA's land, water and biodiversity assets.

The Community Stewardship Grants program will provide funding to support diverse project activities ranging from coastal and wetlands rehabilitation, restoration of wildlife corridors and protecting endangered native fauna, to invasive weed removal and feral predator control.

Premier Mark McGowan and Agriculture and Food Minister Alannah MacTiernan announced the funding on 1 December 2020 in the Chapman Valley catchment near Geraldton, where a \$300,000 grant to the Northern Agricultural Catchments Council will support a natural sequence farming program to regenerate and rehydrate productive farmland in the Mid-West.

Other successful projects include a study by Noongar people of cool burn technique for land management in the Great Southern; protecting the red-tailed phascogale which is declining in numbers and building shellfish reefs to restore water quality, fisheries and biodiversity in the Peel-Harvey Estuary.

The Shire of Kojonup received funding for two projects to establish vegetation corridors along Tarup Creek and 52 Mile Creek.

Thinking about Fox Baiting? Free baits still available!

This collaborative project is funded by the Australian Government through the 'Communities Combating Pest and Weed Impacts during Drought Program – Biosecurity Management of Pests and Weeds'. Farmers can get assistance with paying for a Restricted Bait Permit through DPIRD

The first baiting year has gone, but there is still room for **more farmers to be involved**, with comments on the dried meat baits like:

"I am very impressed with these fox baits. As you know I have baited for many years with dried meat and sausages and it is rare to see more than one dead fox for about 20 baits taken (5%) (and even rarer to find red beads in any scat).

So far I am about half way through my baiting and without going out of my way to look for them the dead fox rate is about 12%. The baits get taken quickly too so I think the fact they are vac packed not dried makes a difference. "Lynley Anderson, Boilup Farmer



"I am so pleased with our baiting success. 80 out of the 100 baits were taken and there are dead foxes all over our farm." Jen Egerton-Warburton, Mobrup Farmer

Christmas Fun Fact

Did you know, Santa stretches time like a rubber band, in order to deliver all the gifts in one night? According to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), there are 2,106 million children under age 18 in the world. If we assume that each household has in average 2.5 children, Santa would have to make 842 million stops on Christmas Eve, traveling 221 million miles. Given the different time zones, Santa has 36 hours to deliver gifts, therefore his average speed would be approximately 650 miles per second.
