

Bali disease outbreak threatens rural devastation in Australia

Foot and Mouth disease in communities has been detected in Bali, the closest it has ever come to Australia, and the government has warned an outbreak here could cost the economy up to \$80 billion.

The highly contagious foot and mouth disease spread through Indonesia to the holiday island, the federal Agriculture Department confirmed on Tuesday, prompting urgent warnings for travellers in a desperate attempt to stop them from bringing the livestock disease home with them.

The disease spreads among livestock either as an airborne disease or through contaminated feed, faeces and even clothing. It does not infect humans but a visitor to Bali who goes near a farm animal could bring the disease home on their clothes or shoes.

Frontline biosecurity officers are inspecting flights from the island, the department confirmed.

"Australia has strict biosecurity protocols in place to prevent high-risk materials, such as contaminated equipment or clothing, animals and animal products, being brought in by travellers who may have been exposed to diseased animals," the department said in a statement.

An outbreak of the disease, which causes painful lesions on cloven-hoofed animals including sheep, cattle, pigs and goats would wreak a devastating toll on farmers, not least because infected animals are destroyed to halt the spread of the infection.

General Manager of agricultural think tank the Australian Farm Institute, Katie McRobert said the UK's experience with the disease showed that an outbreak would cause "massive impact from a deeply traumatic experience" in Australia's rural communities.

The UK's foot and mouth outbreak in 2001 forced the destruction of more than 6 million pigs, cows and sheep at an estimated cost of £8 billion.

Australia's industry is much bigger than the UK, with the beef industry worth \$20 billion a year and sheep \$7 million.

"You can still talk to farmers today in the UK, all these years later, who tell you about the burning pits, the stench across the landscape, the immense distress this caused and the ongoing pall cast over the entire farming community," Ms McRobert said.

Australian farmers across vast districts could be forced to cull their herds and re-enter lockdowns just months after the COVID-19 pandemic. State-controlled biosecurity laws have sweeping powers that could bar livestock and feed from being transported across borders and between local government areas.

Authorities are already <u>scrambling to control of an outbreak of the deadly varroa mite</u>, which kills European honeybees, after it broke out from the Newcastle port.

Previous outbreaks of varroa mite in New Zealand and the US saw the numbers of beekeepers fall by half and Ms McRobert said a foot and mouth disease would be a "double punch for the Australian agricultural industry".

"Biosecurity departments are already stretched to try and limit the first incursion, let alone a second incursion of this magnitude. Varroa won't just hit beekeepers but all the pollination services, which flows on into our cropping industries and horticulture industries. To have another disease outbreak in the livestock sector would be almost unthinkable."

Foot and mouth is endemic on the Asian continent and <u>it arrived on Java in May</u>. Farmers have since then been pleading with governments to throw any resources they can muster at preventing an outbreak. An outbreak could force a ban on red meat exports that lasts for years. The federal government estimated in 2013 that a large outbreak could <u>cost the economy up to \$80 billion</u> – the equivalent of the combined gross product of Tasmania and the ACT.

National Farmers Federation president Fiona Simson called on travellers to be vigilant when returning to Australia.

"Australians have done the right thing through COVID, taking precautions to stop the spread ... our farmers now need travellers to treat the threat of foot and mouth disease with the same amount of caution.

NSW Farmers chairman of biosecurity Ian McColl called on the federal government to urgently fix biosecurity screening "before it was too late".

"It is clear that there are gaps in the system, because Varroa mite reached our shores and evaded detection.

"Good luck – not good management – seems to be the only thing keeping biosecurity threats out of Australia.

🐾 What not to give your dog 🐾

It can be tempting to give our dogs sneaky leftovers or share our food with them, but it is important to remember that certain foods that are safe for humans can be harmful to canines. Because dogs have a different metabolism, feeding human food to them can be extremely dangerous, and even poisonous.



The sudden appearance of a hound's nose and/or head under one's armpit.

Typically occurs at mealtimes, but can occur at any opportunity when food is being consumed by a human.

Below is a list of common foods that can be harmful to dogs and why.

- 🐾 Avocados dangerous partly due to a fungicidal toxin called Persin. Only High doses are lethal
- Apples The flesh of an apple is not toxic, however the seeds can be poisonous due to a compound called Amygdalin. It must be consumed in large quantities and chewed to be toxic.
- Garlic Can be fatal to dogs due to a compound called Thiosulfate that damages red blood cells. It takes a lot of Garlic to cause toxicity, but some breeds can be particularly sensitive.
- Macadamia Nuts In general, nuts are not good for dogs, especially macadamia nuts. These are ranked as the most toxic, which can lead to vomiting, weakness, hyperthermia, and loss of bodily functions.
- Mustard It won't be lethal in small doses; however it can be toxic in higher amounts.
- *Artificial Sweeteners (xylitol) This is a sugar alternative found in human foods such as candy and baked treats. It's extremely toxic to dogs and can cause rapid insulin release that can put them in a coma within 15-20 minutes.
- * Chocolate This one is more commonly known to be toxic to dogs. Chocolate contains a stimulant called Theobromine which is poisonous to dogs. It mainly affects the gut, heart, central nervous system and kidneys.
- 🐾 Onions The same as garlic, Onions also contain Thiosulfate which is toxic to dogs.
- Cooked bones Although not poisonous or toxic, cooked bones pose a risk to dogs due to splintering and in large doses can cause constipation or perforation.
- **Grapes and Raisins** These rank the most serious food threats for dogs. Small amounts can even cause sudden kidney failure, and more commonly cause vomiting and diarrhea.

- Potatoes Are toxic for dogs due to them containing Solanine. It blocks a chemical called Acetylcholine which dogs need to transmit nerve impulses. This can result in issues with the nervous system and intestinal tracts.
- Peaches The peach flesh itself is fine for dogs however the pit contains amygdalin, the same substance in apple seeds.
- Leeks Also contain Thiosulfate, the same compound in Garlic and Onions. These are all foods part of the allium family.

The Shire of Kojonup, Shire of Katanning and the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup have agreed to participate in a Bushfire Risk Management Planning (BRMP) program across WA. The program is responsible for the development, and implementation of 'tenure blind' whole of Shire Bushfire Risk Management (BRM) Plans. We seek a Bushfire Risk Planning Coordinator to develop the BRM plan and assist with its initial implementation to manage risk to the community.

The Shire of Kojonup under the BRMP LG Grant Agreement, will host the Bushfire Risk Planning Coordinator position, however the successful applicant will be required to work across the Shires of Kojonup, Katanning and Broomehill-Tambellup.

An opportunity exists for an enthusiastic and experienced person to become an integral part of three organisations and communities experiencing substantial growth. Applicants will have emergency management knowledge; have an understanding of risk management and be familiar with the roles and responsibilities of bushfire-related organisations.

ANOTHER "FIND" AT OLD BARRACKS

Every busy bee held at the old barracks by the Kojonup Historical Society seems to unearth more articles of historical value.

During the busy bee last Saturday, Mr Don Tunney found a well preserved metal container once used to pour gunpowder into a musket. The container still held a quantity of gunpowder.

Further plans for the re-storation of the old barracks as an historical museum will be discussed at the next Society meeting in the Me-morial Hall at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, June 17. It is hoped there will be a good attendance present.

The first chapter of "The History of Jingalup," com-piled by Mr Anthony Barker will be read during the meeting.

A very comprehensive study of Jingalup's history, Barker's project also in-cludes many old photo-graphis, and any persons wishing to hear the reading are invited to attend the meeting. comprehensive meeting.

The Society has received many requests from the newly formed Australian Innewly formed Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies in Canberra, for details of old tribal grounds, relics, customs and legends of the original Kojonup natives.

Anyone with information they think may be of use is asked to contact the Society secretary Mrs M. Bienell.

asked to contact the Society secretary, Mrs M. Bignell. The type of information wanted is wide and varied, including old district water-ing spots, sit down places, sacred areas, trees and rocks, old photos or sketches of aboriginals and original weapons and tools.

Two elderly Kojonup men

Two elderly Kojonup men have given accounts of hockey matches played at Kojonup by natives about 60 or 70 years ago.

Jam sticks, heated in a fire, bent to the desired shape in the fork of a tree and left to cool were used, and the ball came from under the heart of a blackboy der the heart of a blackboy

The aboriginals were said to have commenced the game with a bully, but that thereafter rules were virtu-ally non-existent.

Casualties were common, both on the field and on the sidelines.

One of the most popular hockey fields was at Mura-dup, about 100 yards from the main pool, and as many as 150 natives have been seen there during a match. Another favourite ground was near the Kojonup cem-

Many white settlers be-lieved that the game was of aboriginal origin and not copied from the Europeans. However it is probable that the natives were taught by soldiers who had seen ser-vice in India, where hockey is the national game.

Historical Society secretary, Mrs Merle Bignell said the Society was now considering building a staircase to the loft when the building is opened as an historical museum.


The Apexians found in the loft a school counting board and table board, hand-made of wood. They are more than


and among other items found were an old toy sol-dier and a very old thimble. All the items will be displayed in the museum.











It's Raining Cats And Dogs Outside!
