## Foot-and-mouth disease: What can you do to avoid being part of the FMD problem

#### Can I contract FMD?

Unlike <u>hand</u>, <u>foot and mouth disease</u> which can be hugely unpleasant for children, the risk of foot-and-mouth disease to humans is extremely rare and does not result in serious disease.

It is possible for humans to carry the virus in their nose for up to 24 hours, according to the Department of Agriculture, which can lead to onward infection in animals.

The department however assures travellers that FMD is not transmitted to humans through meat.

If a person was to eat a burger in Bali made from a cow infected with FMD, they would not contract the disease.

#### What about travelling from other countries?

It is believed FMD spread into Indonesia via goats smuggled in from Malaysia.

The Australian government's focus remains on the specific threat of the disease arriving in Australia from Indonesia and is working with authorities there to limit the spread.

There are not presently FMD concerns for travellers arriving to Australia from other countries.

If the disease spreads internationally — or arrives here — Australians could quickly be faced with a changed set of trade and travel circumstances.

#### Honesty at the border

As surveillance and biosecurity measures continue to be ramped up, returning travellers — particularly those flying from Indonesia— are being asked to take incoming passenger cards seriously.

"Nobody wants to be the one that brings it in," president of the National Farmers Federation president Fiona Simson told ABC Radio.

She implored travellers to be honest about where they had travelled to and what sort of contact or exposure they might have had with livestock.


"We need to make sure that people are aware that [FMD] is so easy to carry and that if they have been in contact with an animal of any kind, they need to be declaring it," she said.

"You don't need to have been on a farm to carry FMD. You can be exposed just by any sort of contact with a cow or cloven-footed animal of any kind, or having stepped in some animal manure in the street.

## "You could be the carrier. You could be the one who brings it to Australia."

#### **Future Drought fund**

In 2021 the Shire of Kojonup were successful in receiving funding for a – NRM Drought Resilience Grant. This project is aimed at increasing farmer's knowledge and practice of drought resilient pasture and fodder shrubs to fill seasonal feed gaps as well as reduce the impacts of salinity in the region. The two sites – located in the Shire are quite different – with one highly impacted by salt and waterlogging and the other mildly salt affected. Given these two different approaches have been implemented to achieve the best outcome for the sites. They included alleys of mixed species salt tolerant shrubs with perennial pasture seeded between alleys. During July, the landholders planted 8700 seedlings and spread 450kg of pasture seed to cover a combined area of 15ha. Pasture seed is germinating, and recent rainfall will give the seedlings a great start to their establishment. The sheep will be able to intermittently graze the sites once seedlings are established. A field day in Autumn 2023 will be held to inspect both sites and meet with the landholders to discuss the projects progress.

## Shire of Kojonup prepared to fund new emergency communications tower

The Shire of Kojonup will forge ahead with a plan to build a new communications tower despite having a request for funding rejected by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services. Councillors voted at a June 21 meeting to commit to self-funding a new tower after approaches to DFES were largely unsuccessful.

In his report to councillors, Chief Executive Officer Grant Thompson said staff had been

looking into the construction of a new bushfire communications tower "for some time", as well as its location.

"Council has previously deferred decisions to invest in a new tower based on seeking further information and verification of the tower communications 'shadow' as well as trying to secure funding from DFES to cofund the construction of a new tower," he said.

The proposal for a new communications tower dates back to at least February 2017, when the council agreed to form a technical working group on the matter. Council staff met with DFES representatives in March this year to make the request for co-funding, which was rejected.

"In its response to the Shire's request for co-funding, the DFES radio communications team claim they have conducted extensive analysis and service improvement works to the WA Emergency Radio Network during the project and more recently in 2019 and 2020," Mr Thompson said.

Councillors were told the rejection was due to the tower's proposed use for the council's radio communications networks, internet services and as a community radio transmitter.

"Under the provisions of the Emergency Services and Bushfires Acts, DFES can only expend Emergency Services Levy funds relating to the provision of prescribed emergency services, and accordingly, the DFES Commissioner has no authority to allocate funds for the new tower," a DFES representative said.

However DFES confirmed it was willing to pay to have its infrastructure relocated to the new tower once it was completed. At their June meeting, councillors considered a report which put forward three potential options: co-locating its infrastructure to an existing tower such as those used by WA Police or the National Broadband Network; constructing a new tower on Samson Road; and building a new tower at a new location. The new location option was the council's preferred option.

Speaking after the meeting, Mr Thompson said there were two key reasons the council was looking at a new location.

"Firstly, the current tower is coming to the point where it is at the end of its useable life," he said.

"Secondly, we want to increase radio frequency coverage — it has been identified as an issue and it is something we want to improve."

The Shire will investigate other sources of funding to build the tower, but is willing to fund the entire project.

"As it stands, the current situation is a significant risk and it needs to be resolved," Mr Thompson said.

"The bushfires we have had during the last two years has shown us how critical communication channels are in an emergency situation."

A new tower is estimated to cost between \$350,000 and \$500,000, with the exact cost expected to be finalised in the coming weeks.

It is expected to be under construction within a year



## Call for help: Kojonup RSL sub-branch seeks to save town's Anzac Day services amid potential disbandment

The Kojonup RSL has issued an SOS to the community as its last remaining members seek to keep the town's Anzac Day commemorations alive despite fears about the future of the sub-branch.

The problems the sub-branch is facing were outlined in a statement published on the front page of Kojonup's community newsletter on June 24.



The sub-branch has about only eight to 10 active members in their late 70s.

Deputy president Robert Sexton said the sub-branch was "getting on the front foot" to start a discussion about the future of Anzac Day and other commemorations in the town.

"With our age group, we don't have a decade left — we have five years left and the present sub-branch has made the decision that it is best for us to do something while we have the wit and the energy to do it rather than wait until something catastrophic happens when we've lost our mettle," he said.

Mr Sexton said membership had dropped in the past decades as members died or had been unable to continue taking an active role.

"We haven't had a war of a decent size for 50 years or so, so we have a very small amount of exservicemen coming in, which is a good thing," Mr Sexton said.

"We don't wish to have a war just so we can raise our members, but indeed we can have associate members and they can bolster our ranks and keep us going."

The Kojonup RSL has about 20 associate members who help with its operations but do not play an active role in the branch. Other people are eligible to become members — such as relatives of former service personnel — but they have chosen not to.

One of the suggestions the sub-branch has put forward is for younger people in the community to replace ageing members. Another is for a community organisation to be created to run the town's services.

"If the community wants us to continue, they need to say how we will continue — it is not for us to make a unilateral decision about whether this thing exists or not," Mr Sexton said.

Mr Sexton said while local schools ran "unfailingly high-class" Anzac Day services, they were often not held on April 25 due to clashes with the school calendar.

In Katanning, where the RSL sub-branch has been closed for almost a decade, the local Lions Club organises the town's Anzac Day commemorations.

The Shire of Narrogin took the lead for this year's Anzac Day services in the town after the 105-year-old Narrogin sub-branch closed in March.

Kojonup community service clubs have in the past contributed to commemorations.

Mr Sexton said he believed there was strong support in the community for Anzac Day services to continue.

"The demographics are interesting because you have the babies in arms right through to our elderly people, so quite clearly the community wants to remember on that day," Mr Sexton said.

"It is our only national day where we're just people on that day and we don't hold any other affiliations."

Alongside Anzac Day and Remembrance Day services in Kojonup, the sub-branch organises the Anzac Day service in Muradup, 17km west of the town.

The organisation also provides advice to the Shire of Kojonup on the management of local war memorials, with the group currently involved in the Jingalup War Memorial preservation plans.

Shire of Kojonup chief executive Grant Thompson said the council was open to playing a more active role in commemorations.

"What we can do is help facilitate and enable the day to happen, so we'll make sure that those people who have that history are involved still, but we can actually help with the organisation," he said.

He said abandoning the town's Anzac Day services was not an option.

"We need to do everything we can to maintain those services in town and recognise the veterans and the people who gave their lives for the freedom we have today and keep it in Kojonup," he said.

"As we look at the intergenerational change happening here, I think it's paramount that the community takes on board something as well, not just relying on the RSL, and we do have a role to play in that.

"At this point of time, it is to be seen where that's going to go."

Mr Sexton said the remaining members of the sub-branch were focused on finding the right path forward.

"We will be talking to all of the organisations in the town, principally the ones which have helped us the most in terms of the local government authority and the service clubs," he said.

"We think we have got about a year or more to get it right and that's the most important thing — to get it right."




#### What's new in your library!



The sender identified himself as an Eritrean refugee who had been held in a Libyan detention centre for months, locked in one big hall with hundreds of others. Now, the city around them was crumbling in a scrimmage between warring factions, and they remained stuck, defenceless, with only one remaining hope: contacting her. Hayden had inadvertently stumbled onto a human rights disaster of epic proportions. From this single message begins a staggering account of the migrant crisis across North Africa, in a ground-breaking

work of investigative journalism. With unprecedented access to people currently inside Libyan detention centres, Hayden's book is based on interviews with hundreds of refugees and migrants who tried to reach Europe and found themselves stuck in Libya once the EU started funding interceptions in 2017. It is an intimate portrait of life for these detainees, as well as a condemnation of NGOs and the United Nations, whose abdication of international standards will echo throughout history. But most importantly, My Fourth Time, We Drowned shines a light on the resilience of humans: how refugees and migrants locked up for years fall in love, support each other through the hardest times, and carry out small acts of resistance in order to survive in a system that wants them to be silent and disappear.



## SAF 2022 Grants to help children with a disability to play sports are now open. Ready, set, go!

Paralympic Gold Medallist Katie Kelly OAM has opened the Sport Access Foundation (SAF) 2022 grants.

SAF provides annual grants to support 7-17 year-olds with diverse health conditions or impairments on their chosen sporting pathways. The aim is to improve accessibility and inclusion and ensure no young Australian is left behind on the sporting sidelines.

SAF's 2022 grants cover four categories of identified needs for children with a disability to play sport.

- The **No Barriers** and **Kick Start** grants assist with sports participation costs.
- Clubs affiliated with a National Sporting Organisation can apply for the BlueScope Sporting Club grants.
- Aspiring Paralympians can apply for the Compete Performance Pathway to Paralympic grants, to help them achieve their Paralympic goals.

The 2022 grants program will provide a kick start for many of your young Australians aspiring to qualify for the 2032 Paralympic games in Brisbane. Many of the applicants could join our growing honour roll of grantees who have joined the Australian para sport elite.

Katie Kelly OAM founded SAF in 2017 after becoming the first-ever Paratriathlon Gold Medallist at the Rio 2016 Paralympics. Through her experience of being hearing and sight-impaired, Katie saw the need to provide assistance to young Australians living with a disability keen to participate in sport.

"Australians love sport, which is at the heart of our culture and identity. But not everyone enjoys the same access to playing and participating. This is what Sport Access Foundation is set up to achieve."

Our message is that if you're a young Australian with a disability, SAF is here to help you get started or move to the next level of your sporting goals."

As well as improving overall inclusion in sport, Ms Kelly said SAF grants are increasingly helping Australian para-sport champions on their road to success.





#### Foot-and-mouth disease: keep Australia free

Western Australia exports about 80% of its livestock and livestock products annually. Access to these markets depends on Australia being free of foot-and-mouth disease.

#### What is foot-and-mouth disease?

Foot-and-mouth disease is a highly infectious viral disease that affects cloven-hoofed (two-toed) animals including sheep, cattle, pigs, goats, buffalo, camels, alpaca, llama and deer.

Affected animals may survive foot-andmouth disease, but they take a long time to recover and often do not regain their full productivity. Surviving animals may also become carriers of the virus.

Foot-and-mouth disease could enter Australia by:

- illegally imported meat and dairy products being fed to pigs
- people returning from overseas with the virus on clothing, footwear or equipment.

#### What would an outbreak mean?

Western Australia exports about 80% of its livestock and livestock products every year. An outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease would result in:

- closure of livestock export markets
- severe economic impact on the livestock industries and regional communities
- a cost of more than \$52 billion over 10 years.

#### What can you do?

- Reduce the risk of an outbreak:
  - Do not feed meat, swill or any other prohibited feeds to pigs.
  - Ensure overseas visitors to your farm wear clean clothes and disinfected shoes.
- Know the signs of foot-and-mouth disease.
- **Immediately report** any signs of footand-mouth disease to a vet.

#### Early reporting is key

Recognising and reporting foot-and-mouth disease early can help to contain its spread. Minimising spread will reduce the devastating economic and social costs of an outbreak to producers, the livestock industries (including abattoirs, saleyards, stock agents and transporters) and regional and national economy.

To report signs of the disease, call the:

- emergency animal disease hotline on 1800 675 888 or
- your Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) vet or
- your private vet.

#### How does foot-and-mouth disease spread?

Foot-and-mouth disease is highly contagious. The virus is present in large amounts in the blisters, saliva, urine, manure, milk and breath of infected animals.

The virus spreads between animals by:

- direct contact with an infected animal
- air-borne particles from infected animals
- movement of infected animals
- movement of contaminated animal products (such as wool or manure), vehicles, equipment and people.

The virus can survive in the environment for several weeks. Virus particles can remain in people's noses for up to 24 hours.

Animals usually show signs of foot-and-mouth disease within 3–5 days of infection, but signs can take up to 14 days to appear. Infected animals spread the virus before they show signs of the disease.

#### Signs of foot-and-mouth disease

Signs of foot-and-mouth disease vary depending on the species infected and the virus strain. Signs of the disease include:

- blisters in the mouth, nostrils, teats or on the skin between and above the hoofs.
   (Blisters may not be obvious until they have ruptured.)
- slobbering/drooling
- lameness, reluctance to move
- lack of appetite
- reduced productivity
- sudden death in young animals
- a large drop in milk yield in dairy animals
- abortion in pigs.

In sheep, blisters are usually small and often difficult to see. The signs are often mild and lameness may be the only visible sign.

To report suspicious disease signs, call the:

- EAD hotline on 1800 675 888 or
- your DPIRD or private vet.

#### Social wellbeing

Health and wellbeing is often separated into four (4) sub-categories – physical, psychological, social and financial.

We tend to focus on physical and psychological health; however social interaction is a major contributor to our overall health and wellbeing. Our experience of the world is influenced by our physical health, mental health, the relationships we have with others, our job and financial security, and the environment in which we live. These factors are all inter-related and can affect our overall wellbeing in a positive or negative way.

When we feel physically well, we are more open to others and to new ideas, relationships, and experiences. This openness is inviting, creating the opportunities for meaningful relationships to develop. When we are exhausted or have low-energy, we tend to be more focused on ourselves, more likely to perceive threat from others, and just less willing to strike up a conversation or extend ourselves to try new things.

#### When physical wellbeing is low, our social wellbeing may suffer.

Social wellbeing relates to our ability to build positive and meaningful relationships and connections. Humans are social beings, and we need connection to flourish in this world.

Our limbic system (the part of the brain responsible for our behavioural and emotional responses), thrives when we are surrounded by people we feel connected to, particularly if we feel safe, supported and cared for. COVID opened our eyes to this need, and many of us could not wait to socialise with our friends and family and get back to our "normal" way of life.

During COVID, the wellbeing of society was in direct focus, and the line between physical, mental and social health became blurred. There was a huge focus on physical health and protecting the vulnerable, and the side effect of this was a society (and world) which became disconnected, isolated and lonely.

#### Did you know?

Recent events tell us how important social wellbeing is to our overall health.



#### So how do we improve our social wellbeing?

Just like physical and mental health, we need to take action and make conscious decisions to improve social wellbeing. Here are three (3) helpful tips to improve your social wellbeing.

#### 1. Make connections


Embrace social interactions in your day-to-day life. This could be meeting new colleagues at work through social events, getting involved in sporting or community programs to meet new people in your area, or having a brief interaction with a stranger at the shops.

#### 2. Be proactive with your social life

Be proactive in arranging catch up's with your friends and family. Schedule in time every week or month that is dedicated to social wellbeing. This could be a weekly walk, coffee catch up, or a monthly movie or quiz night.

#### 3. Set shared goals with your colleagues or friends

Shared experiences can help you create stronger bonds, as you share a mutual goal or focus. Setting physical goals, such as walking 30 minutes per day, can help you improve your physical health and social health.

#### Toastie style chicken tortillas

Are you looking for a more satisfying lunch option? We've got you covered.

Serves 4/15 min prep/5 min cooking time

#### Ingredients

- 1 x small BBQ chicken (remove skin and bone)
- 8 x burrito tortillas
- > 250g cottage cheese
- > 1 x red capsicum, finely chopped
- 1 x green capsicum, finely chopped
- Coriander leaves, chopped (to taste)
- > 310g can creamed corn

#### Tip

Serve with a variety of steamed vegetables for a healthy and quick dinner option.

#### Method

- Remove skin and bones from BBQ chicken, and shred meat
- Prep all ingredients, including chopping capsicums and coriander leaves.
- Place four burrito tortillas on to a chopping board, cover each of the tortillas with small portion of cottage cheese, shredded chicken, chopped capsicum and coriander, trying to divide ingredients evenly between four tortillas.
- Spread creamed corn on to the remaining four tortillas, and place corn-side down onto the chicken mixture tortilla.
- Pre-heat sandwich press, using oil or baking paper as required, and place tortillas (one per serve), onto sandwich press. Cook for 3 to 4 minutes, or until crisp.
