9:00am - 10:10am	Chief Executive Officer to update Council on:     i. Straying cattle	CEO and Ranger outlined ongoing concern regarding stock (predominantly cattle) straying onto Road Reserves in search of food, whether fences have/haven't been maintained between land holders and the public thoroughfare and what Council can do to enforce the land owner to ensure stock are adequately secured along road reserves!  Distinct from fences is another issue - animal husbandry, in that "Why are cattle searching for food and prepared to knock down fences in order to do so?"  The issue is not isolated to Kojonup as this matter has been the
		The issue is not isolated to Kojonup as this matter has been the subject of previous WALGA and Law Reform Commission reports especially in relation to motorists colliding with straying stock.  Section 484(b) of the <i>Local Government Miscellaneous Provisions</i> Act 1960 Part XX – Cattle Trespass, Pounds, Pound Keepers and

Rangers provides that if the owner of cattle permits the cattle to be at large in a street or other public place he commits an offence. Penalty: \$200. This provision empowers a local government to fine the owner of straying cattle, however is \$200 a sufficient deterrent and does it cover the costs of processing and enforcing the fine?

Karratha (Shire of Roebourne) have tried to capture nuisances/straying stock in a Local Law:

#### Division 5—Livestock

### 2.32 Livestock not to stray

The owner or person in charge of livestock shall not permit that livestock to stray or to be at large in a street, public place or upon private property without the consent of the property owner.

### 2.33 Impounding of livestock

- (1) An authorised person or a member of the police force may impound livestock found straying in contravention of clause 2.32.
- (2) Livestock being impounded shall be placed in the pound or secured on private property with the consent of the owner.

### 2.34 Property to be fenced

- (1) The owner or occupier of property on which livestock is kept, shall cause the property or a portion
- of the property to be fenced in a manner capable of confining the livestock, to that portion where the livestock is kept.
- (2) The minimum fencing requirements to confine livestock in a rural or special rural area shall be a fence of post and wire construction.

# Penalty

- 2.32(2) Permitting livestock to stray, or be at large in a street, public place or private property without consent \$250
- 2.34 Failing to keep property fenced in a manner capable of confining livestock \$250

This approach according to Council officers appears to have been successful as non-compliance can result in Fines Enforcement taking additional action against the defaulting person until the fines are paid. A report will be submitted for Council consideration at the October 2015 Council meeting.

10:25am - 11:20am	Chris Thompson – Department of Sport & Recreation – Geocache opportunities	Chris provided an excellent presentation on Trail and Geocaching opportunities for Kojonup. Lotterywest have \$1.3m available for trails and strongly encourages Kojonup to apply. Geocaching adds another dimension to trail experiences by providing "family fun with a high-tech twist." Geocaches exist at the Wool Wagon, Rose Maze and "Barracks" but there are so many other opportunities that capture the natural and heritage aspects of Kojonup. <a href="https://www/geocaching.com/">https://www/geocaching.com/</a> Roy Mercer from Denmark has an international following given his ingenuity in making and siting geocaches and Chris was confident Roy would enjoy the opportunity to develop concepts with Kojonup.
		Council is very keen to participate and will be sending the CDO to the WA Trails and Outdoors Conference and suggested that Council sponsor the registration fee for Derek Ringrose from the Kojonup District High School to attend the conference given his interest in orienteering and outdoor activities. 		Katanning has recently formed a Local Drug Action Group (LDAG). Instead of each service and/or community group working towards a solution to drug and alcohol separately, they have come together to create a plan they can work on together.

Cassy spent some time speaking to Trish from Palmerston, who visits Kojonup regularly to provide our community with drug and alcohol information. She was talking about LDAG and how it's a great initiative as without the community behind it, anti-drug and alcohol campaigns can be ineffective. The community as a whole (including those without a drug or alcohol habit) needs to make a change.

A welcome to country was conducted by Vivien Hansen and Gabriel Hansen spoke about how drugs in the Aboriginal community have affected him, his family and friends. Trish from Palmerston spoke about not only drugs but how alcohol related violence was also a main issue in the Great Southern area.

The day was meant to include some speeches of inspiration, from recovering addicts, however no one was available. Unfortunately, for many they still feel the shame and stigma associated with drug addiction and it takes a lot of courage and self-confidence to tell their story at such a public event. A young Noongar girl did however perform some songs about her ongoing recovery.

The event was well organised with plenty of information on offer to the public but there was only a small turnout from the Katanning community. Although the event was scheduled to finish at 3:00pm, most of the information stands packed up and disappeared by lunchtime.

The Year 3 students from KDHS were terrific as were the other displays by Chris Lewis, Colin Clinch and Gary Fleay.</li> <li>Kojonup CWA – letter received thanking Council for use of Sports Complex and CEO welcoming participants.</li> <li>WALGA Training scheduled for February 2016 at Kojonup.</li> <li>TV Reception – letter received in response to Community concerns regarding poor TV reception and 4G. 		Cr Radford:  • Sewerage overflows between Pensioner & Soldier Roads. CEO advised that MRS has raised concerns with Health Dept. and Water Corp in an effort to have the pipe line renewed as "more

of the same" is not acceptable and would necessitate Council going to the Minister and newspapers.  Cr Pritchard:  • Magnet on Fire Break Notice too small compared with previous years and also needs to be located at the top of the page as tends to sag if magnets lower down when placed on fridge. CEO to notify RAO of concern.  • Steel pegs along Kojonup Brook where possible water line may go as part of water harvesting project are being broken and need to be removed. Cr Radford advised that water tests undertaken at the Brook indicate a high level of salinity that would prevent water being pumped from the Brook for use in the Rose Maze or Apex/Peace Park.
