COUNCIL BRIEFS

TEN (10) YEAR ROAD PROGRAM ADOPTED

The Road Program is a living document based on the effective life of each asset and capital work requirements into the future. State Government funding is available through the Regional Road Group and Commodity Routes funding. Roads to Recovery is via commonwealth funding.

The Program is reviewed every year and updated dependent on funding received however the following distribution is presently used;

Council endeavours to allocate a minimum annual amount of \$65,000 and \$45,000 respectively for kerbing and footpath renewal. The Fair Value of the Shires road network as at 30 June 2017 was \$118, 960,542. The 2018/19 Capital Road Works Budget is \$1.3m of which \$900,000 is government funded an additional \$1.15m is allocated for maintenance of existing roads and related assets. Road grading alone averages \$440,000 per annum.

Continued funding from State and Federal Government is paramount if Council aims to fulfil road related



maintenance let alone renewal of the Shires road network. Reduction in road funding will severely affect the Council's ability to perform the annual road program.

The ten (10) Year Road Program is based upon the presumption that road assets continue to be utilized indefinitely requiring the asset to be maintained, renewed or replaced when its condition reaches an intervention condition. FOXES AND RABBITS

Council is seeking community feedback regarding the prevalence of foxes and rabbits within our shire. For example:

- Are fox numbers diminishing or increasing in your location?
- How many lambs/sheep have been killed or mauled by fox attacks this year in comparison to previous years?
- What is the approximate \$ loss to farmers?
- Should a bounty be re-introduced on foxes by the state government?
- Is the release of Rabbit virus controlling/reducing rabbit populations?

KOJONUP CRC

Council welcomed the opportunity to recently discuss and offer assistance to the committee regarding the development of a new Business Plan for the Kojonup CRC over the next 2 - 3 months which clearly demonstrates achievable programs and services including measurable outcomes and a need for reinstatement of State Government funding.

WALGA /HARVEST MASS MANAGEMENT SCHEME

A reminder to our farmers and transport operators to submit their applications for the HMMS Road List as soon as possible to ensure that Main Roads has time to assess and endorse applications before harvest commences. Through the West Australian Local Government Association the following recommendation has been supported in response to proposed changes to the Harvest Mass Management Scheme;

- 1. Subject to part 3 of this resolution, supports continuation of the Harvest Mass Management Scheme to enable heavy vehicles that meet the requirements of RAV 2, RAV 3 or RAV 4 to travel on roads not assessed for the RAV network between paddocks and the nearest RAV route during the harvest period.
- 2. Advocate that any roads assessed on the initiative of Main Roads that do not meet the requirements for addition to the RAV network at the level used under the Harvest Mass Management Scheme remain unassessed for the purpose of network definition.
- 3. Advise MRWA that any condition requiring an Agricultural Pilot to accompany the RAV combination to facilitate the movement between the paddock and the nearest RAV Network road, is not acceptable.
- 4. Request Main Roads Heavy Vehicles Section to work with stakeholders in providing an alternative solution, prior to the 2018 harvest, to the proposed requirements for an Agricultural Pilot, on unassessed roads, that is within the legal boundaries and is acceptable to Industry.

LANDCARE

How the Plastic Bag Ban Will Make a Difference



Every plastic bag that is refused, makes an impact!

Here are some quick stats from the National Retailers Association:

- More than 670 milling lightweight plastic bags were used in Western Australia in 2017 and of these, approximately 7 million were littered;
- Lightweight plastic bags are easily blown by the wind, littering streets, parks and waterways;
- When they enter the ocean, they endanger wildlife;
- Plastic bags also break up into small fragments (microplastics) and can be ingested by marine and land animals, entering the human food chain.

Don't be discouraged, if you forget or run out of your reusable bags on one trip to the shops, there is always your next visit. It can take a minimum of 21 days to form a new habit.

Movement at the Robinson Road Old Rubbish Tip Site



Landscaping has begun at the old rubbish tip with earth moving equipment smoothing out the piles of dirt, preparing it for future revegetation.

The Shire of Kojonup has put significant funds towards the rehabilitation of the site with future works including more earthmoving to create a natural landforms, spraying weeds and revegetation using local native species.

The rehabilitation process will take a number of years as it is a large site. Please refrain from dumping any materials on the site as this will increase the cost of the project.

Above the main offender is the Australian Golden Wattle (Acacia pycantha).


If you are interested in helping out for an hour or two to remove these plants, a working bee will be held on Wednesday the 5 September 2018 from 8:30am.

Wildlife in focus: Numbat

The Numbat (Myrmecobius fasciatus) is a small marsuipial now found only in the wild in south-west Western Australia. It was previously found across much of southern Australia but since European settlement, Numbat numbers have declined dramatically.



The list below shows places where Numbats have been sighted or reintroduced in Western Australia:

Numbats are insectivores and feed exclusively on termites, an adult eats up to 20,000 termites a day. Because of their diet, Numbats are diurnal (active during the day) and their daily activity changes throughout the year. Just as termites are active at different times of the day depending on the season, so too are Numbats.





Breeding takes place from late December through to late February and up to four young are born after a gestation period of just 14 days. The young are carried around on the mother's teats until late July when they are deposited in a burrow. The youn are independent by spring of the same year and leave their mother to set up their own home range.

Habitat destruction and the introduction of feral predators such as cats and foxes continue to threaten the numbat's survival.

Organisations, including Perth Zoo, the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions and the Australian Wildlife Conservancy, are working to save Numbats in the wild through breeding and translocation programs, fox baiting and monitoring wild populations.



DID YOU KNOW?



Focus on: Solar Panels

In general a building permit is required before any building work can commence. The definition of building work in section 3 of the *Building Act 2011* includes:

- A) the construction, erection, assembly or placement of a building or an incidental structure; or
- B) the renovation, alteration, extension, improvement or repair of a building or an incidental structure.



'Incidental structure' is defined under the Act as a structure attached to or incidental to a building. Therefore the placement (installation) of solar panels attached to or incidental to a building is considered building work requiring a building permit – unless an exemption applies.

For solar panels, in the Shire of Kojonup, the *Building Regulations 2012* provides an exemption for the attachment of photovoltaic panels to the roof of a Class 1 (house) or Class 10a (shed) building. However, if strengthening works are required to the existing roof to be able to accommodate the panels, a building permit would be required for the structural improvements. The installation of solar panels on all other buildings e.g. offices, warehouses, shops, industrial buildings requires a building permit before works are undertaken.

LOW INCOME HOUSING: JEAN SULLIVAN UNITS

Did you know that the Shire of Kojonup own and operate 5 low income housing units in Kojonup?

These consist of four 2 x bedroom units for over 55's and a 3 bedroom family unit.

To be eligible for the units you must meet the following criteria:

- Be an Australian citizen or permanent resident
- Live in Western Australia and receive your income here
- Earn no more than the current income limits as per table below.
- Not own or part own property or land
- Not have cash assets in excess of \$38,400 (singles) or \$63,800 (couples), (seniors over 60) \$80,000
- Be able to prove your identity
- Be 16 years of age or above
