Managing Performance:

REMINDER: NBN™ CHANGEOVER

Do you have a home or business phone, fax line, a DSL broadband connection or alarm monitoring service that runs over the old copper network?

What comes as surprising news too many people is that once the NBN becomes available in your area, there is an 18 month grace period to switch to the new service before the old connections are turned off, potentially cutting off your phone and internet.

With the new NBN™ infrastructure rolled out last year in Kojonup, according the NBN Co, the old copper network has been earmarked for disconnection from January 2019 and any services you have running on the old network will also be disconnected.

If you are in the process of getting your old service(s) cancelled or upgraded to the NBN $^{\text{TM}}$ then you probably don't need to anything more, however if you haven't started, then time is running out to upgrade to NBN $^{\text{TM}}$.

Haven't upgraded yet and want to keep your services? Here's what you need to do:

- 1. **Don't panic**. Contact your service provider(s) to check whether your service runs over the copper network and if you do, they should be able to tell you what you need to know to transfer across to the NBN™. However, **BEFORE** you move your service over, please check that all your existing equipment will work on the NBN™ service (see item 2 below).
- 2. Your equipment must be NBN™ compatible. The NBN™ may not support all equipment that was designed to be used with the copper network. These include devices such as medical alarms, security alarms, telephone handsets, fax machines, and even EFTPOS machines. If you are unsure you can check with the manufacturer or supplier who should be able to let

It is important to be aware that equipment connected over the **nbn™** access network WILL NOT WORK DURING A POWER BLACKOUT. To find out how your NBN connection type or **nbn™** Multi Technology Mix (MTM) is affected by power lost, please visit the website below:

There are some services that will not be switched off:

Some existing phone lines

The copper network within **nbn**™ Fixed Wireless and Sky Muster™ Satellite areas will not be switched off. Premises within these areas will have the choice to keep your existing landline phone service over the copper network active, or switch over to a VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) service on the **nbn**™ access network through your phone and internet provider who can connect your new phone via the **nbn**™ supplied equipment. Contact your phone and internet provider to check your address to see what technology you receive at your premises.

Other fibre providers or private networks

If your phone or internet is already provided over another fibre network, such as a network provided by your building owner, private enterprise network, health or education network, or a cable network that's not owned by Telstra or Optus (such as TransACT − excluding ACT customers being migrated to the **nbn**[™] access network, OptiComm, Pivit, etc.), they should continue operating unless your provider advises otherwise.

Foxte

If you're subscribed to Foxtel pay TV over satellite or Telstra Cable, it will not be switched off as part of the **nbn**™ access network rollout. If you access any Foxtel services via the internet (through an Xbox, PC, tablet, smartphone, smart TV, etc.), ask your phone and internet provider if your connection will be in line with Foxtel's minimum requirements.

Paterson's Curse in Kojonup

Over the past month, two sightings of Paterson's Curse have been made by members of the public and reported to the Shire of Kojonup. While the Shire is not the regulatory body for Declared Plants (regulated under the *Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007*) it is important to

remember that landowners are legally required to control outbreaks of species listed on the Western Australian Organism List, of which *Echium plantagineum (Paterson's Curse or Salvation Jane) in one.*

Description

An erect annual (occasionally biennial) herb to 1.5 metres high, commonly 30-60 centimetres, reproducing by seed. Native to southern Europe. Widespread throughout the south-west of WA, and the eastern Goldfields.

Stems: one to several stems arise from base, much branched and covered with stiff white hairs.

Leaves: alternate, bristly. Rosette leaves to 25 centimetres long, oval to oblong, stalked and with distinct lateral veins. Stem leaves are smaller and narrower, not stalked and almost clasping the stem.

Flowers: purple, rarely pink or white, crowded along one side of a curved spike. Five petals joined in a curved trumpet shape, two to three centimetres long. Five stamens, two of which are longer than the others and extend beyond the petals.

Fruit: a group of four nutlets surrounded by a stiffly bristled calyx.

Seeds: brown to grey, two to three millimetres long, three sided strongly wrinkled and pitted.

Toxicity

Paterson's Curse is toxic to horses, pigs and young or breeding stock and should not be used for grazing, especially after spraying when it is more palatable.

Pigs are most sensitive to poisoning followed by horses. Cattle, sheep and goats are only occasionally affected. British breeds or sheep are more susceptible (or they find the weed more palatable) than merinos.

Eradication strategies

Isolated plants can be manually removed providing most of the taproot is extracted and burnt if flowering or seeding. Graze heavily with wethers or rams over spring to reduce seed production. Shear sheep and allow up to 7 days for seed to pass through the gut before introducing them to clean areas. Avoid introducing hay or feed that is contaminated with weed seeds to clean areas.

Spray graze pasture with 500 mL/ha Tigrex® in early winter before the weed has reached the 6 leaf stage and repeat if necessary. Spray top at flowering with 1 L/ha paraquat(250g/L) and repeat if necessary. Blanket wipers applying 5-10 g/ha metsulfuron(600g/kg) or chlorsulfuron(750g/kg) or 1 L/ha paraquat provide good selective control in spring.

For isolated plants, spray the leaves until just wet plus a 10 m buffer area, with a mixture of 100 mL Tordon®75-D in 10 L of water. This will kill most broad leaf plants, but not grasses, and leaves residual herbicide in the soil that controls seedlings for about a year.

For larger areas spray with 0.5 g chlorsulfuron(750g/kg) plus 25 mL wetting agent in 10 L water in winter. This will also control seedlings for several weeks.

Cultivation controls existing plants but also tends to encourage a new germination. Winter grazing tends to increase infestations. Glyphosate and metsulfuron provide good control of existing plants.

In cropping areas, graze heavily in spring. Spray top at flowering. Burn stubble. Cultivate at or before the break of the season. Spray with knock down herbicides. Plant a crop using as much tillage as possible. Apply herbicides in crop. Burn stubble. Repeat for 3 years. Spray graze pastures annually before the weed has reached the 6 leaf stage and repeat if necessary for at least another 3 years and spray top or manually remove flowering plants in spring.

Reboot your perspective on recycling this National Recycling Week

New research commissioned by Planet Ark has found that while the majority of Australians trust their kerbside recycling does actually get recycled, almost half of us aren't sure of what happens to it and a significant proportion believe it goes mostly to landfill.

As China's waste import 'ban' hits Australia and our population and waste levels continue to rise, recycling right matters now more than ever. This year Planet Ark is encouraging Australians to reboot their perspective on recycling in the most important National Recycling Week (12-18 November) since it was founded 22 years ago.

Residents, businesses and organisations around Australia can help by taking control of their own recycling journey and discovering the many elements of recycling that lie outside the public eye. Nearly all Australians recycle and think of themselves as conscientious recyclers, but many residents want to know what happens once the wheelie bin is emptied from kerbside.

Planet Ark's National Recycling Week was founded to put a national focus on the environmental benefits of recycling. This year's theme, From Waste War to Recycling Reboot, aims to resolve some of the confusion surrounding how to recycle right and what happens to our recycling once it has left our hands. To achieve this, a range of materials from kerbside recycling and other recycling programs will be followed on their journey through the emerging circular economy.

A council survey conducted by Planet Ark found that the most common recycling mistake made by residents was soft plastics (like bread bags), bagged recyclables and food scraps or organics being placed in the recycling bin. These mistakes cause problems at sorting facilities and lead to more of Australia's recyclables going to landfill.

"National Recycling Week is the perfect time to reboot your own recycling habits," says Ryan Collins, Planet Ark's Recycling Programs Manager. "Planet Ark's research has revealed that despite 71% of people being confident in knowing what can and can't be recycled, 61% would still like to see more information on these topics."

It's not all doom and gloom either with a number of positive recycling stories emerging this year. Bingo Industries have reported an increase in their industry leading construction and demolition recycling rates to 85% at their Minto facility. MobileMuster has recycled over 1,400 tonnes of mobile phone components overall with 99% of materials being recovered. Nespresso now has over 20,000 collection points for their coffee capsules. Popular Unilever brands using 25% locally sourced recycled plastic will be on the shelf in 2019. Whilst Cartridges 4 Planet Ark

is very close to breaking the 40 million cartridges recycled barrier.

Households are also being given a helping hand to recycle right with the launch of the Australasian Recycling Label (example below). It aims to help consumers understand which bin a piece of packaging should be placed in. Planet Ark has also released the 6 Golden Rule of Kerbside Recycling that tackle the most common recycling conventions to help clear up confusion. In addition, the new recyclingnearyou.com.au website has been redesigned to make it even easier to find out what can be recycled in your area.

Nespresso is dedicated to ensuring your last drop of coffee does not need to equal its last use. That's why in 2013, Nespresso partnered with recycling expert, Sell & Parker, to establish a specialised plant in Nowra as part of the development of its nationwide aluminium capsule recycling program.

Five years later, the plant continues to play a pivotal role in ensuring the nation's love of premium coffee is environmentally sustainable. Since then Nespresso has expanded its recycling network to now include more than 22,000 collection points around the country. But while Australians may have convenient access to a recycling option, many still don't know what happens to their beloved Nespresso coffee once they send it onto the plant.

Nespresso uses aluminium to package its coffee, which not only retains the freshness and taste of coffee but also is one of very few materials that is infinitely recyclable. Many people will be amazed to learn that 75% of all aluminium ever produced is still in use today*.

The Nowra recycling system enables recovered coffee grounds to be repurposed, used as rich and nutritious compost at a nearby composting facility. Meanwhile, the aluminium is sent back into the regional aluminium industry, ensuring the aluminium capsules have a second life as another everyday object. Over the last few years, Nespresso have developed a number of innovative limited edition products created from used Nespresso capsules in partnership with established brands. This includes a Victorinox Swiss Army Knife, a Caran D'Ashe pen, and a Vélosophy bike.

SNAKES ON THE MOVE

If you locate a snake around your property or come across one whilst bush walking, there are a few important things you need to know.

What to Do

Do not approach the snake

Most snake bites occur when people try to catch and kill them. Watch it from a safe vantage point. Ideally watch it from an elevated platform and keep pets and children away as they will be curious or dogs may be aggressive towards the snake.

Do NOT try to catch the snake
Do NOT throw anything at the snake
Do NOT try to chase the snake away
Do NOT yell at the snake
Do NOT try to kill the snake

Do NOT panic

Leave the Snake Alone

Under no circumstance should you try to catch the snake, it should be left alone. If you have disturbed the snake and it has become aware of your presence then give the snake space and move yourself away slowly.

Stay Calm

If the snake is within a very close proximity then stand still. Movement scares snakes. By slowly moving away or standing still, you are not behaving like a threat to the snake. If the snake sees no threat, it has no reason to defend itself.

Restrain Pets

If you have a dog with you, make sure the dog is restrained.

Call an Expert if Needed

If you need a snake to be removed call a licensed snake remover, depending on your area your local Shire will have a list.

Snakes are very timid and shy and despite what many people may think, they are not aggressive and do not attack or chase people. Snakes do not bite large immovable objects (like a tree, a fence post or you if you're standing still!)

Discouraging Snakes

Snakes are attracted to an area in pursuit of food (mice or rats, etc.) and habitat. By decreasing the availability of these two variables it is possible to reduce the likelihood of snakes entering the vicinity around your house. Chook sheds and bird aviaries should be rodent proof and all animal food should be stored in air tight containers. If you do have a rodent problem, use a product called "Racumin" as this will not give secondary poison to other animals that may eat an affected rodent. You must however, ensure that pets, chickens, etc do not have first access to the bait otherwise your pets will be poisoned.

Habitat

A well maintained lawn free of refuse provides a poor habitat for snakes. It also allows good visibility which reduces the incidence of people accidentally stepping on a snake. Any material lying directly on the ground can provide habitat for snakes. This can include such things as timber, iron sheeting, grass clippings and firewood.

Taking precautionary measures can be taken to reduce available habitat for snakes. Building materials and fire wood piles should not be stored directly on the ground but raised at least 100mm off the ground on strips of timber and away from the house.

Some species such as Tiger Snakes feed on frogs. Ponds and other water sources that provide frogs with habitat have the potential of attracting this



species of snake. For this reason it is a good idea to situate ponds a sensible distance from the house.

Characteristics

DUGITES are very shy and will move away if allowed to. They will not confront you unless you have cornered it or you are showing aggression towards it.

TIGER SNAKES are not a fast moving snake and therefore may stand their ground if confronted. They will flatten their neck and body to let you know they are not happy and if this occurs, you must slowly move away immediately.
